On behalf of the Benton Police Department, I am honored to present our 2024 BNPD Annual Report. The purpose of this report is to share with our citizens the status of our department and the quality of work the men and women of the BNPD are producing.

Within this annual report, we will share charts, stats and pictures of our city and our department. As with any report, it cannot by itself adequately portray everything that our department and its employees do for our city, but it can give you a glimpse of the efforts being made and the quality of work our members produce to make Benton a better and safer place to live.

In 2024, the Benton Police Department had a budgeted workforce of 83 Certified Police Officers and 12 Civilian Employees, who serve a community of 35,014 residents. We pride ourselves in hiring the best and most qualified candidates, because we understand that our employees are what makes BNPD a top-notch Police Department.

Members of the BNPD strive to provide our city with an exceptional level of service to those that call Benton home, and to all those that use our services. Benton Police Officers continue to display outstanding performance in their day-to-day operations and consistently demonstrate their commitment to providing a high quality of service to the citizens of Benton. All our personnel, both sworn and civilian, work tirelessly to support the mission of the Benton Police Department.

In 2024, the City of Benton saw its lowest crime rates in the last 14 years. In fact, 2024 marks the 6th year in a row that the City of Benton has had a reduction in its overall crime rate. 

The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)
Program was conceived in 1929 by the
International Association of Chiefs of
Police to meet a need for reliable,
uniform crime statistics for the nation. In
1930, the FBI was tasked with collecting,
publishing, and archiving those statistics.
Today, several annual statistical
publications, such as the comprehensive
Crime in the United States, are produced
from data provided by nearly 17,000 law
enforcement agencies across the United
States.

DIVISION SPOTLIGHT

TRAINING

Lt. Michael Payton and Sgt.
Andrew Talbot oversee the BNPD
Training Division. In 2024, they
were both newly transferred to
the division and began
implementing a new system to
track and manage officer training,
certifications, and records while
also updating previous training
records.

Additionally, they revamped inventory management and made sure officers were equipped with needed resources.

They facilitated critical training exercises throughout the year such as active shooter exercises, which prepared over 400 first responders for real-world situations. Firearm training and combat courses were also among the many trainings organized and conducted by this division to ensure realistic scenarios and stress-inducing conditions were encountered.

In 2024, BNPD exceeded 29,000 hours of training!



DIVISION SPOTLIGHT

K-9

K-9s Ryno (Sgt. French), Nino (Officer Collins), and Havoc (Officer Howard) are cross-trained in patrol and narcotics detection. The department's K-9 teams play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of the police department, providing immeasurable support and resources to patrol and narcotics operations.

These teams have been credited with numerous drug seizures, apprehensions of violent offenders, and searches for people while aiding the Benton Police and other state agencies. Currently, the K-9 handlers and their K-9s are assigned to both the Patrol Division and Special Investigations Unit. In addition to their duties as K-9 handlers, the K-9 Teams are also a vital part of the Benton Interstate Criminal Enforcement Patrol, or BICEP Team. These officers are specially trained to conduct high volume, professional traffic stops to seek out and arrest felony suspects traveling on Interstate 30, which runs through the heart of the City of Benton.

Two-year old Ryno and Sgt. French's partnership began in January 2024 after they graduated from Ventosa Kennel in North Carolina. K-9 Ryno is certified through the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association (NNDDA) and Ventosa Kennel. Ryno is trained to detect the odors of Cocaine, Heroin, Methamphetamine, MDMA, and Fentanyl. Sgt. French is also a certified K-9 Instructor and Trainer through Ventosa Kennel, Inc. Ryno had 27 vehicle deployments in 2024, and of those, there were seven arrests and seven narcotic seizures. He was also deployed for two tracks of suspects from pursuits.

Three year old Nino and his handler Officer Collins also trained at Ventosa Kennel, Inc. in the beginning of 2023. Following their graduation, they certified through the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association (NNDDA) in narcotics detection, tracking and apprehension of individuals. K-9 Nino and Officer Collins are currently assigned to the Patrol Division where they assist their shift with traffic stops, vehicle searches, tracking, and apprehension of violent offenders. They also assist other agencies and specialized divisions such as the Special Investigations Unit (SIU) and BICEP Team. During the 2024 year, K-9 Nino and Ofc. Collins had 15 deployments that resulted in several narcotic seizures and arrests.

Officer Howard and K-9 Havoc (age 2) became partners in June 2024 and are certified through the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association. K-9 Havoc is a Belgian Malinois trained to detect a variety of narcotic odors. He is also trained in personal handler protection and tracking. K-9 Havoc and Officer Howard are assigned to the Patrol Division, and over the last seven months, they have had 22 deployments, some of which resulted in arrests and the confiscation of multiple narcotics.

DIVISION SPOTLIGHT

PEER RECOVERY/ OVERDOSE RESPONSE TEAM

Since May 2023, Benton Police Department has been the grateful recipient of funding through the Arkansas Opioid Recovery Partnership, enabling our agency to have an Overdose Response Team.

Overdose Response Teams enable law enforcement agencies to have a Peer Recovery Specialist and Overdose Investigator on staff.

Certified Peer Recovery Specialist Misty Evans provides peer services to those battling substance abuse disorder. She assists members of the community in accessing needed resources for recovery and organizes community events to promote these services.

In 2024, the Overdose Response Team assisted at least nine individuals in getting treatment. In addition, Misty hosts classes for inmates and training and events that are open to the public.
